





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Hancock Adams Common

Quincy Square, Hancock Street between the new City Hall and United First Parish Church discoverquincy.com

Completed in 2018 and situated in the heart of Quincy's downtown, this three-acre park and plaza boasts two ornamental fountains and monumental bronze statues honoring two of the City's most famous inhabitants, John Adams and John Hancock. This pedestrian mall has plenty of seating and open green space and is connected to Old City Hall, 1844, United First Parish Church, 1828, and Hancock Cemetery, 1640.



Abigail Adams Birthplace 180 Norton St, Weymouth | 781-277-1271 abigailadamsbirthplace.com

As First Lady to the second President of the United States and mother of the sixth President, Abigail is one of the most respected and influential women of the early revolutionary period of American history. Built in 1685, the Abigail Adams Birthplace was her home until she married John Adams in 1764. It has survived two relocations and restoration work was recently completed. Salt Marsh Trail And Sailors' Home Cemetery 386 Fenno St | 617-376-1253 discoverquincy.com

A half-mile self-guided nature walk — designed to showcase the major plant and animal species that find their homes in and around the Quincy salt marsh — leads to a cemetery with the remains of US Navy veterans housed at the National Sailors' Home. The long rows of simply shaped white marble stones set up a pleasing rhythm as they slope towards the marshland which overlooks Quincy Bay.

Christ Church Burial Ground

Historically significant as the site of the original building and cemetery of the First Church of England in Braintree, the oldest Episcopal parish in Quincy, and the second formed in Massachusetts (the first being King's Chapel in Boston). This historic cemetery has 200 gravestones.

Flags For Vets Island


With more than 400 flags, Quincy's newest tribute to Old Glory has become our city's most patriotic site. This visually impressive field of flags honors those who served our country. Site and services held for Memorial Day and Veterans Day are coordinated by the Sons of American Legion Morrisette Post 294.



Hall Cemetery 85 Crescent St | 617-376-1253 quincyma.gov

This cemetery is associated with Solomon Willard, "the Father of the Granite Industry" and noted architect of the Bunker Hill Monument and Quincy City Hall.





United First Parish Church 1306 Hancock St | 617-773-1290 ufpc.org

Known as the "Church of the Presidents," this church was built from Quincy granite in 1828 with funds provided by John Adams. Tours include a visit to the Adams family crypt—the final resting place of Presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams and First Ladies Abigail and Louisa Catherine Adams. Visitors can view their memorial tablets, President John Adams' baptismal record and sit in the pew of President John Quincy Adams.



Brackett's Tavern Liberty Tree

Site of Quincy's Liberty Tree, rallying place for patriots prior to the American Revolution, Liberty Tree Park is located in an elongated traffic island that has remained in the middle of this three-way intersection since the early 1700's. In 1959, Quincy's Granite Manufacturers Association placed a granite monument commemorating the locations of community's Liberty Tree and Brackett's Tavern, an important community gathering place.



John Winthrop Jr. Iron Blast Furnace 61 Crescent St

The son of Massachusetts' governor and one of the principal founders of Connecticut, John Winthrop, Jr. operated the first iron smelting furnace in the British colonies, one of the earliest industrial ventures in America (1645). You can view the excavated remains of the furnace, read about its history, and see artist renderings of the furnace in full operation.



Josiah Quincy House 20 Muirhead St | 617-994-5930 historicnewengland.org

This country estate overlooking Quincy Bay transports visitors to the Revolutionary War era and tells the story of a woman's work to preserve her family's history more than a hundred years later. Revolutionary leader Josiah Quincy built the house in 1770. Quincy and his family played key roles in the social and political life of Massachusetts for generations, producing three mayors of Boston and a president of Harvard.






Mt. Wollaston Cemetery 20 Sea St | 617-376-1295 quincyma.gov

The first two plots of one of America's earliest garden cemeteries were ceremoniously purchased in 1856 by Charles Francis Adams, Sr. A stone wall is dedicated to the memory of Thomas Morton who in 1625 led the settlement here after the arrival of Captain Richard Wollaston. The variety of ornate gravestones and granite monuments beautify this outdoor museum and honor three Adams descendants whose lives were lost in service to our country, as well as, veterans, former Mayors and prominent granite industry leaders.



Maypole Hill 90 Samoset Ave | 617-376-1253 discoverguincy.com

Thomas Morton, the first English person to build a plantation in 1624, known as Mar-e-Mount on Massachusetts Bay, operated a successful trading post. On May Day, 1627, he erected a Maypole. The site is commemorated on the City's Seal. Depicted with a large tree, an historical marker notes the location, and its remains can be seen at the Quincy History Museum.



Abigail Adams Cairn 1-9 Viden Rd nps.gov/adams

The Abigail Adams Cairn marks the spot on top of Penn's Hill where on June 17, 1775, Abigail Adams and her seven-year-old son John Quincy observed the smoke and fire of the Battle of Bunker Hill. The cairn, an ancient form of commemoration, was erected by the Daughters of the Revolution in 1896. Its stones came from private properties and historic sites. During historic preservation work in 2008, a time capsule was discovered.



Adams National Historical Park - Presidential Birthplaces 133 Franklin St | 617-773-1177 nps.gov/adams

The John Adams and John Quincy Adams Birthplaces are the oldest presidential birthplaces in the United States. John Adams was born in the house 75 feet from the birthplace of his son John Quincy Adams. Young John started his family, launched his career in law and politics, and it was here that he, Samuel Adams and James Bowdoin wrote the Massachusetts Constitution.




New England Wildlife Center 500 Columbian St, Weymouth | 781-682-4878 newildlife.org

New England Wildlife Center is the only comprehensive wildlife hospital in the metro-Boston area that provides care for sick, injured and orphaned wild animals. The Center has an on-site nature center and biology classroom and a windowed veterinary hospital where the public can observe first-hand their collective impact on wildlife. The Center was chosen by the Massachusetts State Legislature as one of the top 1,000 places to visit in Massachusetts.



Nut Island 147 Sea Ave | 617-223-8666 nps.gov

Part of the Boston Harbor Islands National Recreation Area, and one of the few accessible by land, this property offers stellar vistas of the Boston skyline and other Harbor Islands. A great place to watch the sunset, this location is popular for walking, picnicking, or fishing from the pier.



Quincy Historical Society & Museum at Adams Academy 8 Adams St | 617-773-1144 quincyhistory.org

The Adams Academy, built of Quincy granite, is an early and important example of Gothic revival architecture in America. Endowed by John Adams as a preparatory school for boys, it was built on the site where the legendary patriot John Hancock was born. Now home to the Quincy Historical Society whose museum showcases the city's history from Native American times through the early 21st century and archives are a major resource for information on local and area history. The collection includes books, pamphlets, manuscripts, images, maps, audio and moving-image recordings covering the full range of Quincy history with particular interest in Adams family ephemera, the Quincy granite industry, Quincy shipbuilding, and genealogy.

The Thomas Crane Public Library inspires curiosity, sparks imagination, fosters community, and connects people to the online world with a wide variety of literary, arts and cultural resources.





Hancock Cemetery 1305 Hancock St quincyma.gov

From 1630 to 1854, Quincy's most illustrious residents and civic leaders were buried here; Henry Adams, the first Adams to live in Quincy and ancestor of John Adams; Colonel John Quincy, for whom the city is named; patriot Josiah Quincy and Veterans of the Revolution, the War of 1812, and the Civil War. The memorials offer a chronicle of gravestone art from colonial winged skulls and cherubim, to Federalist classical motifs, to Quincy's 19th century role as the national center for granite quarrying and carving. View Google maps to take a virtual tour or use for a self-guided walking tour.



Old Town Hall

Built in 1844, old City Hall is one of the oldest functioning seats of government in the country. Its academic Greek Revival architecture has been described as one of the outstanding examples of mid-century classical American design. Unusual in both its monumentality and in the severity of its granite detail, these features may be attributed to its architect, Solomon Willard, who was instrumental in the development of the granite industry in Quincy.



Quincy Quarry And Granite Workers Museum Lyons Turning Mill, Quarry Hills Dr | 617-472-1322 quincyquarrymuseum.org

The Lyons Turning Mill and Fuller Quarry site is the home of the Quincy Quarry and Granite Workers Museum. Immerse yourself in the history of one of New England's most important 19th Century stone-working communities as you walk through the mill ruins and explore the mini museum. Built in 1894, the mill used giant lathes to turn granite and other kinds of stone into columns, spheres and works of art. The Quincy Quarry Railroad ran through its center, and a 20-ton overhead crane inside the mill handled the stone products that were produced there. Visit the museum's website for hours and special events. Private tours available upon request.



John Hancock Birth Site at Adams Academy In 1737, John Hancock was born in a house on this site. The house was later the home of the Josiah Quincy family. In 1822, John Adams, in endowing a school to prepare boys for college, specified it be built on this

site to honor Hancock, "to whose great exertions and unlimited sacrifices this nation is so deeply indebted."



United States Naval Shipbuilding Museum and U.S.S. Salem 549 South St, Pier 3 | 617-479-7900 uss-salem.org

Quincy's proud shipbuilding history comes to life aboard this Cold War-era heavy cruiser. Berthed at her home port, the former Fore River Shipyard, the USS Salem also serves as home to the "Kilroy Was Here" catchphrase and the United States Naval Shipbuilding Museum.



Adams National Historical Park, Peacefield, The Summer White House

Built in 1731, the Old House at Peacefield became the residence of the Adams family for four generations from 1788 to 1927. It was home to Presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams; First Ladies Abigail and Louisa Catherine Adams; Civil War Minister to Great Britain Charles Francis Adams; and literary historians Henry and Brooks Adams.

The grounds include a vast collection of original artifacts such as: what is widely considered America's first Presidential Library with more than 12,000 books, the Carriage House, 1873, an historic orchard, and an 18th-century style formal garden containing thousands of annual and perennial flowers.



Sailors' Snug Harbor Cemetery 333 Palmer St discoverquincy.com


The entrance is marked with a large slate headstone with an incised anchor and inscription: "Here rest retired mariners who in their later years made their home at the Sailors' Snug Harbor, which from 1856-1950 was situated southerly from here one third of a mile." It is fitting the cemetery faces the sea that these men had served so well. The stones are all simply shaped white marble with the merchant mariners' name and age; no birth or death dates are stated.



Souther Tide Mill 622 Southern Artery southertidemill.org

One of only five remaining tide mills in the United States, historic preservation work is currently underway. Built in 1806 on the bank of the Town River, the mill represents the birth of Quincy's maritime and granite industries. Quincy granite shipped from here was used in notable sites including the Boston Custom House, Bunker Hill Monument and Kings Chapel. The brig Souther, built as a gold rush ship, was constructed here and shipbuilding continued through the late 19th century.





Dorothy Quincy Homestead

The earliest surviving home of the Quincy family, this house was built in 1686 by Edmund Quincy and greatly expanded and remodeled in 1706 displaying the evolution of colonial architecture. The house welcomed Benjamin Franklin as a guest and had frequent visits from young lawyer John Adams. It is the childhood home of Dorothy Quincy, who became Mrs. John Hancock — the second President of the Continental Congress, first signer of the Declaration of Independence and the first Massachusetts Governor.

The Consulate General in Boston was established by the Government of Cape Verde in 1977, to protect and defend the interests of the State and its nationals throughout the area of its consular jurisdiction, as defined as: the United States and Canada, with the exception of Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, and Delaware, covered by the Embassy of Cape Verde in Washington DC. Numbering more than 400,000, Cape Verdeans in the USA and Canada have an open window to the Central Administration in Cape Verde, providing them services of an administrative, notarial, judicial and civil registration nature, as well as, the granting of entry visas to those wishing to visit the country.



Quincy's proximity to Boston, easy access to major highways and public transportation, as well as, numerous historic sites and attractions, make the City of Presidents an ideal destination for group tours, meetings and conventions.

Revolutionary Tour

Relive the patriotic fervor that swept through Massachusetts in the days leading up to the American Revolution. Begin at Boston's Old North Church, where Paul Revere received the



signal that prompted his famous midnight ride. Follow Revere's route to Lexington and Concord, where the shot heard 'round the world changed history forever. Then off to Quincy for a visit to John Adams' farm, where the Massachusetts State Constitution – the model for the U.S. Constitution – was drafted, and a visit to Adams National Historical Park including "Peacefield," the Adams Mansion that served as the summer White House for John Adams and his son, President John Quincy Adams.

Presidential Tour

Quincy is located within easy driving distance of four presidential birthplaces. Visit the John F. Kennedy Library in Dorchester, then visit the Adams National Historical Park, John Adams and



John Quincy Adams historic homes, or take a self-guided tour along the Presidents Trail. Then conclude with a drive-by of the birthplace of President George H.W. Bush in nearby Milton.

Maritime Tour

Relive seafaring adventures with a journey through Massachusetts' nautical past. Visit Salem's Maritime National Historical Park before experiencing life on a Cold War era heavy cruiser on board the

USS Salem in Quincy. Then journey south to the New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park, where this former whaling capital's history is carefully preserved.



Military Tour

During your visit to Quincy, if you are currently serving, a Veteran or would like to honor our military men and women, be sure to include the General's Bridge & Park at 100 Parkingway, in your travels. The new General's Bridge & Park honors the contributions of 18 military leaders, all of whom were raised in Quincy. Visit quincygenerals.com for more information.






